A Tribute to Interior Designer Frances Adler Elkins (1888-1953): Elements of a Timeless Style

There is very good evidence that Frances Elkins is one of the main reasons that the Stevenson House was acquired and given to the State Parks for a museum. Why? Elkins was a decorator for both Celia Tobin-Clark and Edith Van Antwerp at the time they became owners. Consequently, on the weekend of May 3-4 there will be the following Spring 2013 Stevenson House event:

"A Tribute to Interior Designer Frances Adler Elkins (1888-1953): Elements of a Timeless Style"

At the time of preparation of this Newsletter details were still being worked out, but here is the tentative schedule:

<u>Friday</u>: Elkins Scholar, Scott Powell, Presentation with power Point: 7:30-9:00 p.m. Champagne aperitif served on patio following presentation.

Saturday: Set up of Frances Elkins small artifacts/photos in Dining Room of Stevenson House: 9:00 (closed to public during set up).

Local Elkins experts Jerry Welling and Diane Bower presenting individual viewpoints/areas of expertise in relation to Frances' interior design, followed by questions and answers by Jerry, Diane and Scott: 10:00 -12:00 a.m. (Jerry and Diane yet to be confirmed).

Scott will return to Stevenson House from 3-4 p.m. to be on hand to visit with members of the public who are interested in Elkins.

Items will be left on display for the afternoon docent 'open house': 1-4:00 p.m. Elkins artifacts will be removed at 4:00 p.m., so this is a one-day only opportunity.

A fee will be charged for the Friday/Saturday evening event - one fee only to make things simple. Viewing during the docent open house will be free to the public. A Chance Encounter with an Old Friend

Does this ever happen to you?......You're reading a book or listening to the radio when – out of the blue - you recognize a quote from or reference to Robert Louis Stevenson? One of our Club members said that this happens to her so often that she has started keeping track. Here's a sample:

- 1. Writer's Almanac on National Public Radio (2013) a Stevenson poem, "In the Highlands" was read by Garrison Keillor.
- 2. <u>The Education of Henry Adams</u> (1907) a historian from a famous American family wrote of his visit with the Stevensons in Samoa.
- 3. <u>Sweet Thursday</u> (1954), the sequel to <u>Cannery Row</u> by John Steinbeck the last chapter took these words and theme from *A Child Garden of Verses*: "I'm sure we shall all be as Happy as Kings."
- 4. <u>The Greatest Journey</u>, by David McCullough (2011) Stevenson's friendships with artists John Singer Sargent and August Saint-Gaudens are described during their days in Paris and Britain.
- 5. <u>The Lark</u> (1895) a literary and humor magazine published by San Francisco bohemians was dedicated to Stevenson after his death.
- 6. <u>Steampunk</u> tales by James Blaylock (1990's plus) these popular stories were inspired by "New Arabian Nights" with the central character named St. Ives.
- 7. <u>The Autobiography of Mark Twain</u> (2010) the recently published memoirs describe a meeting between Twain and Stevenson in Washington Square, NYC, in 1888, when the two discussed "submerged renown."
- 8. National Prayer Service led by Rev. Adam Hamilton, the day after President Obama's Inauguration (2013) Stevenson's story of the Lamplighter was retold for its inspirational message.

Images, themes, and phrases from <u>Treasure Island</u> and <u>Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde</u> are constantly "borrowed" from Stevenson's writings to make a point or a profit! The more one reads Stevenson, the more one understands how much a part of our everyday culture he is.

Stevenson House Archives: Always in Use

There has always been interest in the Stevenson House Archives. This diverse collection of documents and photograph continues to be researched and utilized. The Stevenson House Archives Finding Guide can be found on the Online Archives of California web site. The MSHP Curatorial Staff is always responsive to requests for materials or information from the Archive Collection, further promoting and sharing the unique historic resource located in Monterey. Here is a sample from the first two months 2013 of who is seeking information from the Archives.

Benoit Razy from Paris, France is producing a feature film adapted from <u>"Travel with a Donkey in the Cévennes"</u>. He was seeking historic images from the Stevenson House Archives which included a photograph of the Osbourne cottage in Oakland where RLS was ill in spring of 1880,

Dr. Gillian Hughes, Manchester England is editing RLS' "Weir of Hermiston" for the New Edinburgh Edition of the Collected Works of Robert Louis Stevenson. She requested scanned images of the two pages of RLS' manuscript from the Stevenson House Archives.

Letitia Henville, a PhD candidate at the University of Toronto, is currently working on Stevenson's 1890 collection Bal-

lads. She requested electronic copies of RLS' original composition, "Farewell to Tautira". This title is among the three sheets manuscript music for flageolet that Stevenson composed.

RLS' 1880 - Oakland short-term residence

Jane Condie, of the Advocates Library in the Parliament House, Edinburgh was also seeking RLS music. She requested a copy of "Aberlady Links" which was included in an opera recital sponsored by the Advocates Library.
